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

We recommend that if you are referred back it is to your original surgeon or team (if available) for reasons of continuity.

You will be reviewed in the clinic at 6 weeks to 3 months following your surgery and again at one year with an X-ray. If you develop any symptoms in between these appointments please contact the hospital for an earlier appointment.

If you are doing well and the X-rays are satisfactory you may be discharged from a regular follow up at your annual review. Following which if you develop any symptoms please arrange a review appointment through your GP.

All joint replacements wear with time, this is also dependent on the level of activity. Ten years after your surgery, we recommend a check X-ray from your GP.
