# **RJAH welcomes new Chief Finance and Commercial Officer**

We were delighted to welcome Angela Mulholland-Wells (*pictured*) to the Trust at the end of April, as our new Chief Finance and Commercial Officer.

Angela brings with her more than 15 years' experience in the healthcare sector, having held a number of senior finance leadership positions. Her career has spanned both the independent sector, where she's serviced as regional finance director of private hospitals, and the NHS, most recently as Director of Finance at an NHS acute Trust.

Angela takes over from Craig Macbeth, who has now left the organisation after an HNS career spanning 33 years, more than half of which was served at RJAH. We thank him for his tireless hard work and his significant contribution.

#### Partnership working leads to new servce

We have launched new minor diabetic foot service, which provides essential surgical intervention for diabetic patients with tendon-related foot conditions.

The service, which runs in partnership with The Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital NHS Trust (SaTH), aims to support patients who require minor procedures, such as toe tenotomies, to prevent the progression of deformities that can lead to serious complications, including ulcers and infection.

It has been introduced in response to an increasing demand for specialist foot surgery for diabetic patients in Shropshire – which has one of the highest amputation rates in the country. <u>Read more on our website</u>.

### New programme of Sexual Safety Training launched for staff

Last year, the Trust signed up to the national Sexual Safety Charter – pledging as an organisation to foster a safe and respectful workplace. Now, as part of this ongoing commitment, we have unveiled a series of sexual safety training sessions for staff.

Sexual safety at work remains a priority at RJAH, and we take a zero-tolerance approach to any unwanted, inappropriate or harmful sexual behaviours.

Denise Harnin, Chief People and Culture Officer, said: "Staff may know colleagues that have been impacted by these issues, or they may be a manager that needs support to better understand how staff can be affected.

"Some behaviours that were once seen as acceptable or 'banter' are not tolerated in today's world, and these sessions will help navigate right and wrong, with open sessions and open learning, and no judgment."

## Award win for Paediatric Team who have transformed patient experience

Our Paediatric Team have earned national recognition – being named winners at the prestigious National Orthopaedic Alliance (NOA) Excellence in Orthopaedics Awards.

The team picked up the Supporting Patients of their Pathway Award at the ceremony, for their work on improving pre-admission and procedure experiences for children; a project that has transformed pre-operative services for young patients and their families.

The comprehensive pre-assessment pathway supports children coming to Alice Ward (our dedicated children's ward) for surgery, rehabilitation and other procedures, and has been designed to improve their overall experience.

The service includes both face-to-face and virtual appointment options, integrated support from the Play Team, and innovative digital tools such as Remcare and the Little Journey app. It offers tailored interventions for children with high levels of anxiety or more complex needs, helping to reduce stress and improve outcomes.

#### Vacancies on our Council of Governors

### Popular TV comedian officially opens therapeutic garden for children

A new outdoor therapeutic garden designed to support the health and wellbeing of our young patients has now officially opened. Garden for Alice was officially earlier this month by Harry Hill, comedian, TV personality and writer.

The project was made possible thanks to a dedicated fundraising appeal by the RJAH Charity, which launched in 2022 and raised more than £240,000. Work on the garden began in October 2024. Read more on our website.

### New solar panel funding awarded to RJAH

The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero recently announced a package of £100 million from Great British Energy for the NHS to install solar power and battery storage solutions to help drive down energy bills, offering better value for the taxpayer.

As part of this groundbreaking new funding, RJAH has been awarded £2.4million to install further solar panels. Investing in renewable energy generation will deliver reductions in energy costs that can be redirected into front line care.

These new solar panel installation projects are expected to deliver savings of around £8.6million a year, and up to £260million over the panel's lifetime across the NHS. RJAH has plans to significantly expand our solar energy capacity, adding a further 1.2MW system to our existing 2MW installation. This expansion is projected to deliver an additional £300,000 in annual electricity savings and reduce the hospital's carbon dioxide emissions by 220 tonnes each year.
