Of course, this leads us on to the next challenge for the Trust which is the restoration of our services that so many of our patients require. This will be a long and complex programme, but I do know that all clinicians and support staff will be determined to see elective cases back underway at RJAH as soon as possible.

# Covid vaccination site opens at RJAH

The coronavirus vaccination programme took another step forward in Shropshire, Telford & Wrekin when the county's second hospital hub opened at RJAH on Thursday 7 January.

Since its opening, the vaccination hub has transitioned into a vaccination centre meaning patients are able to book appointments through the national booking system when invited to do so.

The first patient to receive their vaccine at RJAH was grandmother-of-three, Freda Hays, aged 91, from Whitchurch.

Freda said: "When I was contacted to say I would be having the first dose of my Covid vaccine, I was extremely surprised but also felt very relieved and hopeful.

"I'm looking forward to when things start to get back to normal again and I'll be able to spend more time with my family, rather than just the doorstep visits.

Nurse Rebecca Warren was the clinician who gave the first jab at the hospital site. Rebecca is the Clinical Lead Nurse for the RJAH Hub, having been redeployed from her usual role as Nurse Manager for the Midland Centre for Spinal Injuries.

Rebecca said: "I am proud to be able to contribute to the national effort to roll out the coronavirus vaccine, and by doing this I really feel I get to be a part of history.

"It's been a real team effort and everyone has worked so hard to enable this to happen. I feel very proud to be leading the team at RJAH to ensure we protect everyone. This is the outcome we all want, in order to be able to see our loved ones again and be safe."

## Colin Chapman – Public Governor for Shropshire

#### How have you contributed as a Governor so far?

"I have attended most of the Council of Governors (CoG) Meetings, taken part in walkabouts and Governor Surgeries until the coronavirus pandemic struck. I have attended Governor Workshops, both physically and virtually, as well as read and responded, if required, to updates from communications to keep myself up to date so that I can perform my role as best as I can."

#### Why do you think the Governor role is important?

"The Trust is there to provide a high level of healthcare to the public. In order to achieve this, these services on occasion required to be scrutinised to ensure that they are delivered to a high and safe standard. I feel that the Governor role is very necessary to monitor or challenge if services are compromised or sub-standard."

#### What do you think CoG has achieved and what do you enjoy?

"As a group we all have different levels of experience ranging from finance, communications, clinical experience, and charity and fundraising. It is this collective experience that allows us to focus on key areas that we have experience in and are then able to share with fellow governors and challenge specific issues raised at meetings.

Personally, I find this immensely satisfying particularly as I was an employee at RJAH for 30 years starting as early as the mid-1970s and then returning in the late 1980s to finish my career.

The NHS is ever-changing and so are local services, it is more important than ever that Governors have a key role in its future to ensure that these services continue at a high and safe level."

#### How has RJAH responded to the coronavirus pandemic?

"RJAH stepped up to the pandemic head on. They were quick to respond and converted a ward into an isolation unit specifically for coronavirus patients, without question and achieved this with impeccable professionalism. Collaborating with our local general hospitals was swift but allowed us to provide a trauma service whilst they concentrated on caring for the ever increasing number of covid patients. Whilst extremely challenging for our Trust as many employees were re-deployed in areas well out of their comfort zone, they rose to it with pure professionalism, all credit to those involved.

Caring for our patients is paramount but in view of the pressures of covid caring for our staff have never been so important and I am proud to be part of that and offer my support when I can."

### Representing People

When Parliament created NHS foundation trusts, it provided them with independence from central government and a governance structure that ensured participation from within the local communities they serve.

NHS foundation trust governors are the direct representatives of local interests within foundation trusts. Governors do not undertake operational management of NHS foundation trusts; rather they challenge the board of directors and collectively hold them to account for the trust's performance. It is also the governors' responsibility to represent their members' interests, particularly in relation to the strategic direction of the trust.

Legislation provides governors with statutory responsibilities to help deliver these key objectives. The legislation is the National Health Service Act 2006 and the Health and Social Care Act 2012. Please note that meetings of the Council of Governors are open to members of the public. The public are asked to notify the Trust of any matters they wish to raise in advance, as this will allow the Trust to be able to respond fully and will assist in the time management of the meeting. Jayne Johnson, Clinical Placement Facilitator, joined the online meeting with nurses Helen Crawley, Jo Davies, Stephanie Doleman, Kathryn Dytor and Mat Wright.

A total of 17 nursing students; as well as several therapy, radiology and operating department practitioner students; joined the workforce at the Oswestry-based hospital back in April 2020 to support the response to the first wave of the covid-19 pandemic.

## Hospital vaccination hub administers 20,000th jab



The covid vaccination hospital hub at RJAH administered its 20,000th jab at the end of February, heralding "a monumental step towards helping to protect everyone against this awful virus".

In just over six weeks since the first batch of vaccines arrived at the site, more than 20,000 jabs have been given to the first set of patient priority groups, including health and social care staff from across the region.

Spinal cord injury patient Pip Wright, from Tarporley, was the recipient of the milestone vaccine.

Pip said: "I feel absolutely delighted that I was the 20,000th person at the hub at RJAH to have had the vaccine – what an amazing milestone that is. It's also extremely reassuring for me and my family.

"I'm classed as being clinically extremely vulnerable and although that's not how I associate myself, it feels great to know I will have some protection from the virus in the weeks to come."

## Morrisons supermarket supports comfort of patients

Morrisons Supermarket in Oswestry has set up a toiletry donation point for inpatients at RJAH where shoppers can donate toiletries to help provide extra comfort for patients.

The local community have rallied behind the initiative which is being supported by the League of Friends.

"None of this would be possible without the support of the local community so we'd like to say a big thank you for all their help and kindness with this initiative."

The donations from shoppers are held centrally by the League of Friends in their Main Entrance Shop.

Wards in the hospital can then contact the shop when their stock of toiletries needs replenishing.

## Stellar results for RJAH in National Staff Survey

Staff at RJAH have hailed the standard of care at their own organisation – with table-topping feedback in the National NHS Staff Survey, which has been published today.

A best-ever 96% of RJAH staff completing the survey said they would be happy with the standard of care provided if a friend or relative needed treatment. It is the fourth year in a row that the hospital has secured the highest marks in this question, in a survey completed by staff at more than 300 NHS employers.

RJAH also scores highly as a place to work, with 79% saying they would recommend it. That is up by two percentage points on last year, and puts it within the top three in the country.

## State-of-the-art £25,000 physio gym equipment

A state-of-the-art collection of gym equipment has been revealed in the Physiotherapy department - in a bid to further support the physical and mental wellbeing of patients.

Physiotherapists at RJAH say patients are already benefitting from the new pieces of equipment, which is part of an investment of £25,000 to replace the outdated gym equipment.

The new equipment means that RJAH can better support inpatients and outpatients with their therapy needs.

The new equipment includes various dumbbells and kettlebells, a leg press, a treadmill, spinning bikes, a squat rack and more.

Michael Murphy, Advanced Physiotherapist, said: "Previously at RJAH, we had a limited range of dated equipment which wasn't fit for purpose and we've already seen so many benefits to our patients using the new equipment.

"The investment has meant we can expand our service to meet the current best practice standards, and in turn, enhance our standard of care for patients by reducing the likelihood of post-operative complications and improving rehabilitation."
