Best in class results for RJAH in major national report

Overall patient experience at RJAH is the best in the country – according to the findings of the Adult Inpatient Survey.

The Adult Inpatient Survey is produced annually by the Care Quality Commission (CQC), which monitors, regulates and inspects health and social care services in England.

It is based on feedback from almost 73,000 people who had a spell as a hospital inpatient during November 2020. More than 1,200 RJAH patients were invited to take part in the survey, and the response rate of 74% was well above the national average of 47%.

The survey asked people to give their opinions on the care they received, including quality of information and communication with staff, whether they were given enough privacy, the amount of support given to help them eat and drink and assist with personal hygiene, and on their discharge arrangements.

Highlights include top scoring for overall patient experience with an average mark of 9.54 out of 10. Staff across the Trust were championed by patients responding to the survey. Our doctors were rated as the best in the country and our nurses also came out on top for inspiring confidence and trust.

The hospital's wards and rooms are also ranked as the cleanest in the country for the second year in a row, while patients rated its food as the best as well – for the 15th time in the last 16 years.

Representing People

When Parliament created NHS foundation trusts, it provided them with independence from central government and a governance structure that ensured participation from within the local communities they serve.

NHS foundation trust governors are the direct representatives of local interests within foundation trusts. Governors do not undertake operational management of NHS foundation trusts; rather they challenge the board of directors and collectively hold them to account for the trust's performance. It is also the governors' responsibility to represent their members' interests, particularly in relation to the strategic direction of the trust.

Legislation provides governors with statutory responsibilities to help deliver these key objectives. The legislation is the National Health Service Act 2006 and the Health and Social Care Act 2012. Please note that meetings of the Council of Governors are open to members of the public. The public are asked to notify the Trust of any matters they wish to raise in advance, as this will allow the Trust to be able to respond fully and will assist in the time management of the meeting. RJAH Vaccination Centre celebrate as 100,000 covid vaccinations delivered

The Covid Vaccination Centre at Shropshire's specialist orthopaedic hospital has reached a milestone achievement – as it administered its 100,000th covid vaccination.

In under 12 months since the first batch of vaccines arrived at The Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Orthopaedic Hospital, 100,000 first and second doses of the vaccination have been given to residents across the county, with all adults and health and social care staff, now receiving their boosters.

Shropshire-based auctioneer and television presenter Christina Trevanion was at the RJAH Vaccination Centre on the day of the landmark vaccine.

Many will recognise Christina from popular BBC television programmes such as Bargain Hunt, Flog It!, and Antiques Road Trip.

Rebecca Warren, Clinical Lead Nurse for the RJAH Vaccination Centre, who has led the team since the vaccination centre opened in January this year, was also quick to express her pride at the achievement.

She said: "It's awesome that we've hit the 100,000 milestone – it's a monumental step towards protecting people against this virus."



First cohort of international nurses welcomed to RJAH

An international recruitment drive in Africa, Asia and the Caribbean has led to twelve new nurses joining RJAH.

The nurses have joined the specialist orthopaedic hospital from countries including Kenya, Nigeria, India, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Jamaica, Cayman Islands and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines.

Their arrival is timely, given the well-recognised shortage of nurses currently available in the UK, which has made conventional recruitment challenging.

One of the nurses is Felix Otieno from Kenya, who will be working as a Scrub Nurse in Theatre. He said: "Everyone we have met so far has been amazing and really supportive. I know I speak for the rest of the cohort when I say we all look forward to being part of RJAH, which is an incredible hospital, and caring for our patients."

NHS England support the recruitment of nurses joining from overseas and ensure processes are ethical and that nurses are not being recruited from countries where they have their own shortage of qualified staff.

Sara Ellis-Anderson, Interim Chief Nurse and Patient Safety Officer, said: "There is a well-recognised shortage of nurses in the UK and with the challenges we have experienced in the past 18 months through covid-19, we are greatly in need of some further expertise and support."
