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Information for patients **AFO Footwear**







Tips for finding footwear to wear with your AFO

- Your AFO does not have any grip along the bottom so should always be used inside a shoe.
- Your shoe will work alongside the AFO in supporting your foot/ankle and will help to optimise its benefit so it is important to try and find an appropriate style as advised below.
- The AFO will obviously take up room inside your shoe so sometimes you will need to buy footwear a size or so bigger.

A shoe that fastens, i.e. with laces/hook and loop fastening, is better as it allows you to open the shoe up wider to help put it on and it can be tightened securely to help support you further. The lower down the laces/hook and loop fastening the easier it should be

Most high street footwear has an inlay built into the sole of the shoe. Sometimes these are loose, sometimes they are held down with glue. It is worth looking for shoes that have these in (the thicker the better) and removing them as this will give extra space for your AFO.



You shouldn't use your AFO in a shoe with a heel higher than around 2.5cm/1".

- We tend to find that cheaper shoes are generally made deeper and wider so it is often worth trying supermarkets and alike to find suitable footwear.
- It is best to take your AFO with you when buying new footwear.
- If you only wear an AFO on one leg and need to buy bigger shoes you may need to add an insole into the other shoe to take up any extra space.
- Remember, your AFO is providing you with the support you need and the important thing is to find something to fit over the top to give you grip when walking. You do not necessarily need to buy a particularly supportive/expensive shoe.



Avoid shoes with a small opening

Avoid shoes with too high a heel and pointy toes

Several companies design shoes specifically for AFOs with different opening styles and wider/deeper fittings. Unfortunately, they can be a little more expensive and difficult to source but they are another option to consider. The following are available online
